





37% of the projects in the EDCTP2 portfolio are led by a female:




Female coordinators

2014-2022



EDCTP-supported ethics and regulatory projects are being conducted in 37 sub-Saharan African countries.

Bringing schistosomiasis treatment to preschool-age children

- Published in The Lancet Infectious Diseases in March 2023
- Led by the **Pediatric Praziquantel Consortium**, the PZQ4PSAC project is co-funded by EDCTP and the Global Health Innovative Technology (GHIT) Fund
- Results from the phase III trial showed excellent efficacy, achieving cure rates of 90% or above, and was safe and well-tolerated by young children.
- Submitted a request to EMA for a scientific opinion to facilitate the inclusion of arpraziquantel on the WHO list of prequalified medical products and accelerate regulatory approvals in affected countries.
- **ADOPT programme** (also co-funded by EDCTP and GHIT Fund): preparing for the large-scale delivery of the new medication and ensuring wide acceptance and equitable access for preschool-aged children.
